would quarterback the team the remainder of the game.

Glen Lake would get on the board with a 19-yard touchdown scramble from Hazelton. The Lakers would fail the two-point conversion, but get on the board with the score 43-6.

"We've been down this road before," Angers said. "Things have always turned themselves around so we're just going to continue to get better."

St. Francis added one more touchdown on a 13-yard run and add the extra point to make the score 50-6. Glen Lake took the remaining 1:25 of game time to go down the field and score on a rushing touchdown by Hazelton. The clock hit zero as Hazelton fell into the end zone.

"We're fighting to end," Angers said of the late score. "I was going to go for two. That's what these kids are showing you, they are not going to give up. We could've easily folded up the tent, but they didn't. They said we are going to keep playing and fighting."

Fosmore completed six of his nine passes for 24 yards and an interception. He also added 16 rushing yards on eight carries before leaving the game with his injury.

Hazelton came into the contest and completed four of 12 passes for 106 yards and an interception. He also added 21 rushing yards and two touchdowns for the Glen Lake offense.

Jonathan Wright led Glen Lake in rushing, as he carried the ball 11 times for 76 yards in the game. Drew Peterson led the team in receiving, as he caught three passes for 59 yards. Xavier

Griffiths caught two passes for 53 yards. Griffiths also ran the ball twice for nine yards.

The Glen Lake defense allowed 415 total yards, 316 of them came on the ground from the Glads. Glen Lake did force an early fumble from the Glads, but also turned the ball over twice on two interceptions. The Lakers continue to struggle against St. Francis, but Angers is still proud of the effort the team gave in the game.

"I'm just really proud of the team," Angers said after addressing the team in the post-game circle. "This was of them becoming we, and we grew up a ton from last week. Whether it was our play, our character, or our brotherhood, we are going to continue to get better, and that's what I'm most proud of the team for."

Camryn Knaub ran in the two point conversion to increase the Norse lead, 24-6.

The Norse would trade possessions with Bellaire, before scoring one more touchdown before halftime. The Eagles were faced with a fourth down and punted to the Norse. Lucas Mikesell took the punt 57 yards to the end zone. Smith ran in the two point conversion to make the score 32-6 at halftime.

"I love the enthusiasm from the team," Suttons Bay coach Garrick Opie said. "We had some really good blocks on the line and it was a solid game. I still think there is a lot of things we need to correct, but on both sides of the ball we did quite well."

The Norse opened the second half on the first play with an 80-yard touchdown pass from Bryce Opie to Halvorsen again to increase the Norse lead to 38-6.

Michael Loucks joined in on the fun, as he scored on a one-yard touchdown run to cap off the night for the Norsemen. Cesar Ramirez would add the extra point to make the score 45-6.

The teams would trade possessions the rest of the contest, and Suttons Bay had two defensive stands with Bellaire trying to score points at the end of regulation.

"I'm proud of our defense for making the goal line stand at the end of the game," Opie said. "It takes a lot of guts for guys to step in when other guys are tired and to still perform like that is fantastic so I'm really happy with the defense."

The Norse defense continues to shine, and has allowed just six points in two games. Derek Piglowski led the defense with nine total tackles and two pass breakups. Zach Morton had eight tackles, four and half tackles for loss and had one and a half sacks.

Halvorsen, to go along with his record offensive performance, added four tackles and had an interception. Luke Murphy had seven tackles on the defensive line for the Norsemen.

The Suttons Bay offense piled up 464 yards of total offense, while Bellaire had 104 yards offense.

Opie finished with 215 passing yards and two touchdowns. He also carried the ball four times for 29 yards.

The running game of the Norse made a big impact, as the team compiled 249 rushing yards in the game.

"As far as this team (Bellaire) goes, they are a good team," Opie said. "They spread the ball out well and I'm happy with the win but their are a few things we can do better on both sides."

Mikesell led the way with eight carries going for 123 yards and a touch-

Best showing for Vineyard to Bay

Nearly 300 runners came out Sunday for the Vineyard to Bay 15k and 5k.

The race contributed more than \$14,000 to TART Trails, Suttons Bay Schools and the TCAPS.

"We had 118 finish the 5k and 165 finish the 15k," event coordinator Ross Deye said. "This is our best showing at this race yet."

Awards were given out to the winners of each age group, and the younger age groups top three earned medals.

In the 5k, Kevin Deyo finished in first place overall with a time of 18:48. Jami Grant was the overall female winner, and second overall, with a final time of 19:36.

Bill Rokos finished first in the Masters section, and third overall, with a time of 19:50. Kelly Slater of Suttons Bay finished in first of the female Masters section with a final time of 25:09.

Grand Master winners were James Larson with a time of 20:22 and Donna Kayserian with a final time of 25:17. Larson placed fifth overall in the race.

Keegan Verrett Kiel was the first

male at nine years-old or younger to finish, as he crossed the line with a time of 22:23. Kiel took seventh overall in the event. Evelyn Argo was the first nine year-old or younger girl to cross the finish, as she finished with a time of 28:38.

For the 10-14 year old age group, Jaiden Thompson was the first boy to cross the line. Thompson finished with a time of 21:34 and took sixth overall. Kylanna Verrett Kiel was the first girl to cross in the age group, as she finished with a time of 26:36. Mackenzie Hoehlerl took first place in the female age group of 15-19 year olds. She finished with a time of 28:10.

In the 15k, Corey Valdez finished first overall with a time of 54:58. Matt Nester of Maple City crossed the line second overall with a final time of 55:15.

Erica Harrell was the first female to cross the finish line, ninth overall, as she finished with a time of 1:05:11. Tracy Argo won the female masters group with a final time of 1:10:44.

Rick Hawley placed seventh overall and won the male masters group with a final time of 1:01:50. Frank Treadwell won the grand masters group with a

time of 1:07:18, and Garrett Grant won the boys nine and under age group with a time of 1:23:37.

Ashley Miller won the female ages 20-24 group, as she finished with a time of 1:20:29. Aimee Marsh won the female ages 25-29 group with a final time of 1:07:48.

Heather Abramowski placed first in the female ages 30-34 with a time of 1:11:36, and Erica Solway finished with a time of 1:08:06 to win the 35-39 female age group.

Michael Adams of Cedar placed 30th overall with a final time of 1:14:18 and second in the male 40-44 age group.
